Past Simple

Use the past simple for finished actions, past states and sequences of events. Covers regular -ed spelling rules, the most common irregular verbs, did and didn't, and the time expressions that signal it.

Past Simple

The past simple is the basic tense for talking about **finished** events. The action started and ended in the past, and the time is either stated or clearly understood. It is the tense of stories, biographies, reports and most conversation about yesterday.

Meaning and usage

Use	Example
A finished action at a stated time	I visited Rome last year.
A sequence of events	She opened the door, looked inside and smiled .
A past state	He lived in Vlorë for six years.
A past habit	We played football every Saturday.
A single completed event	The train arrived at nine.
Narrative and biography	Naim Frashëri was born in 1846.

Regular verbs and -ed spelling

Ending	Rule	Examples
most verbs	add -ed	work → worked; play → played
verbs ending in -e	add -d	like → liked; arrive → arrived
consonant + y	y → -ied	study → studied; carry → carried

Ending	Rule	Examples
vowel + y	just add -ed	<i>play → played; enjoy → enjoyed</i>
one vowel + one consonant, stressed	double the consonant	<i>stop → stopped; plan → planned; prefer → preferred</i>
British -l after a vowel	double the l	<i>travel → travelled</i> (US: traveled)

The **-ed** ending has three pronunciations: /t/ after voiceless sounds (*worked*), /d/ after voiced sounds (*played*), and /ɪd/ after *t* or *d* (*wanted, needed*).

Common irregular verbs

Base	Past	Base	Past	Base	Past
be	was / were	go	went	see	saw
have	had	do	did	make	made
take	took	come	came	give	gave
get	got	say	said	tell	told
know	knew	think	thought	bring	brought
buy	bought	find	found	leave	left
write	wrote	read	read	eat	ate
drink	drank	run	ran	begin	began

Note *read* → *read*: the spelling is identical but the past is pronounced like *red*.

Negatives and questions

Form	Structure	Example
Negative	didn't + base verb	<i>I didn't go out.</i>
Yes/No question	Did + subject + base verb	<i>Did you see it?</i>
Wh- question	Wh- + did + subject + base verb	<i>Where did she go?</i>
Short answers	Yes/No + subject + did(n't)	<i>Yes, I did. / No, I didn't.</i>

Because *did* already carries the past tense, the main verb returns to its base form. This applies to irregular verbs too: *Did you **see** it?* — never *Did you saw it?*

Two exceptions: **be** needs no *did* (*Were you there?*), and subject questions with *who* or *what* take no auxiliary (*Who called?*).

Signal words and time expressions

yesterday, last night / week / month / year, two days ago, in 2015, when I was a child, then, after that, at that time, in the end, finally.

A comparison with the present perfect

Past simple	Present perfect
<i>I saw that film last week. — finished time</i>	<i>I've seen that film. — experience, no time</i>
<i>She lived in Rome for two years. — not any more</i>	<i>She's lived in Rome for two years. — still there</i>
<i>When did you arrive?</i>	<i>Have you arrived yet?</i>

Common mistakes

Mistake	Correct	Why
<i>Did you went?</i>	Did you go?	base form after <i>did</i>
<i>She didn't came.</i>	She didn't come.	same reason
<i>I goed home.</i>	I went home.	irregular verb
<i>He stoped.</i>	He stopped.	double the final consonant
<i>She studied.</i>	She studied.	consonant + y → <i>-ied</i>
<i>Did you were tired?</i>	Were you tired?	<i>be</i> takes no <i>did</i>
<i>I have seen him yesterday.</i>	I saw him yesterday.	finished time expression

Learning tips

1. Learn irregular verbs in small groups that share a pattern: *bring-brought, buy-bought, think-thought*.
2. Write a short account of your last holiday, then underline every past verb and check each one.
3. Treat *did* + *past form* as an automatic error to correct.

Summary checklist

- Is the time finished and clear from context?
- Is the irregular past form correct?
- Is the *-ed* spelling correct?
- After *did* / *didn't*, is the verb in its base form?

Shpjegim në gjuhën shqipe

Rregulli i anglishtes, i shpjeguar në shqip

Koha e shkuar e thjeshtë tregon një veprim **të përfunduar** në një çast të mbyllur të së shkuarës. Koha është ose e thënë hapur, ose e kuptuar qartë nga konteksti.

Foljet ndahen në dy grupe. Foljet **e rregullta** marrin mbaresën **-ed**. Drejtshkrimi ndjek katër rregulla: shumica marrin **-ed**; foljet me **-e** marrin vetëm **-d**; bashkëtingëllore + **y** jep **-ied**; folja njërrrokëshe me një zanore dhe një bashkëtingëllore e dyfishon atë (*stop* → *stopped*). Foljet **e parregullta** e ndryshojnë rrënjën dhe duhen mësuar përmendsh: *go* → *went*, *see* → *saw*, *take* → *took*.

Mohimi dhe **pyetja** ndërtohen me foljen ndihmëse **did**, e cila e merr përsipër kohën e shkuar. Prandaj folja kryesore kthehet në formën bazë: *She **didn't go*** dhe ***Did she go**?* Kjo vlen edhe për foljet e parregullta.

Dy përjashtime: folja *be* nuk merr kurrë *did*, dhe pyetjet ku *who* ose *what* është vetë kryefjala nuk marrin folje ndihmëse.

Ekuivalenti në gjuhën shqipe

Ekuivalenti më i afërt në gjuhën shqipe është **e kryera e thjeshtë**: *shkova*, *pashë*, *punova*. Të dyja kohët tregojnë një veprim të mbyllur në një çast të caktuar, prandaj kuptimi kalon lehtë nga njëra gjuhë te tjetra.

Anglisht	Shqip
<i>I visited Rome last year.</i>	Vitin e kaluar vizitova Romën.
<i>She opened the door and smiled.</i>	Ajo hapi derën dhe buzëqeshi .
<i>They lived in Vlorë for six years.</i>	Ata jetuan gjashtë vjet në Vlorë.
<i>He didn't come.</i>	Ai nuk erdhi .
<i>Did you see it?</i>	A e pe?

Ku ndryshojnë dy gjuhët

- Folja ndihmëse.** Shqipja nuk ka asgjë të ngjashme me *did*: folja mbetet në të shkuarën në të tria llojet e fjalisë. Anglishtja e zhvendos kohën te ndihmësja dhe e zhvesh foljen kryesore.
- Dy kohë kundrejt njëres.** Shqipja i dallon *punova* (e kryer e thjeshtë) dhe *punoja* (e pakryer). Anglishtja e mbulon të parën me *past simple* dhe të dytën me *past continuous* ose me *used to*.
- Zakoni në të shkuarën.** Shqipja përdor të pakryerën: *Çdo verë shkoja në det*. Anglishtja përdor *I used to go* ose thjesht të shkuarën e thjeshtë me një ndajfolje.
